
Annual Report 2019

Students and Young Adult Ministry

Guides and Rangers had international adventures, six guides and one ranger with two leaders joined the County trip to visit Switzerland, one of our World centres. One Ranger also represented Midlands Region on a trip to Europe in a team and came 2nd. Another four Guides went on a Midlands trip to Beaudesert for a music festival camp.

World Mission

Support for our *mission partners* continued without any changes, along with support for the Persecuted Church by prayer and donation to Barnabas Fund. In October we became officially linked with a new Tearfund "Connected Church" project in KItgum Diocese in Uganda and started regular financial contributions for this.

Mission focus series. June/July saw an excellent 5 week series on world mission with input from both guest speakers and our own members. Positive feedback was received.

Mission visits, visits were made by Alf and Hilary Cooper, Gill and Jessica Vriend, Jonathan Clark and Ann Fursdon. *The Lent Project* "Heating the house of Hope" raised funds for Vera Zhuravleva to install central heating in the house in Murmanskie Vrota. It has not yet proved possible to do the work, but we are confident the goal will be achieved.

The World Mission Group (WMG) met 6 times, comprising Simon and Denise Bridgens, Lois Clark, Judy Cooper, Dave Smith, Jacqueline Wienkamp, and myself, with Alan Whaites joining in December.

Of our *budget* for the year: £33, 560, £28,740 was given to partner support. From the year's allocation for a new mission area £1050 was given to Tearfund, £2000 held over for use in 2020, first priority a need linked with the project, but may be used otherwise, £1000 added to allocations as below.
